Previous Meeting Minutes

CAC Representative Update

Daniel Arnold, CAC Representative February Report included the following highlights:

- Special Thank you to CMHA-CEI Board Members who attended Winter Conference Workshop entitled: Tri-County CIT
 Special thank you to those board members who attended the CMHAM Winter Conference and was able to attend the Tri-County CIT workshop in which I presented. I was in tears and overjoyed to tell my story alongside Lansing Police Department Social Worker Melissa Misner.
- Review of CAC Member Candidate CAC Applicant Interviewed. Members of CAC were very impressed with the candidate. If approved, looking forward to the new addition to CAC.
- Crisis Care Center

Crisis Care Center progress is very exciting! It's heartwarming that CAC has had the opportunity to name this crisis stabilization unit and now have a say in the logo and color scheme. Little details and big details matter to consumers across the spectrum of neurodiversity.

Logo Images

CAC discussed interpretation of the logo images we called "Toucan Bird" and "Moon.". Our points of view were mixed and we suggested a survey be taken to finalize. There was some discussion that our current CMH logo looks like an inverted quarantine symbol and hazardous materials sign. We feel bad that so much money was spent on creating this logo and wondered if we are able to submit suggestions as a CAC to propose a change? We were thankful once again our voices were heard.

ACTION: Zoe from Piper & Gold listened and will apply suggested modifications.

Annual Review of Bylaws

The modification in language was moved from "consumers" to "persons served" and "Behavioral Health" to "Behavioral Health/ Mental Health" rather one or the other as there was a strong stigma regarding the blanket term "behavioral" as if a recipient did something wrong when it's actually a disease. The term "victim blaming" comes to mind for one member. In terms of voting membership, it was stated that the CAC needs a minimum and if that minimum is not fulfilled, the terms should be extended until properly met. We also saw a modification in the

Bylaws implemented to remove "serious"" in front of the words "mental illness" as we want a diversity of recruitment including mild and moderate mental illness persons suffering as well. We are inviting, but not requiring the board liaison to be present for CAC Candidate Interviews. In addition, we solicit feedback from all council members on these interviews, but it is not required. The Bylaws notices that no matter how many meetings a council member attends in a day they will only get one stipend. We are grateful for the explicit information, but wonder if the policy is fair.

Review Program & Planning (P&P) Committee Draft Agenda
 The draft agenda for the upcoming P&P meeting, scheduled for Monday,
 February meeting was reviewed by CAC members.

There were no recommendations to the Board of Directors from CAC.

Announcements included:

• The CMHA-CEI Annual Report to the Community Event is scheduled for Tuesday, April 1, 2025 at the Lansing Center.

The next CAC meeting is scheduled for Thursday, March 6, 2025 @ 3:30 pm., and will be held via Zoom.

Mid-State Health Network (MSHN) Update:

CEO, Sara Lurie provided a general update related to the Region ISF savings funds reporting that based on all of the unknowns, including rate setting, enrollment and increased costs there is concern that the funds will be depleted by the end of next FY if the state does not adjust the rates.

Board member, Dr. Paula Yensen advised that she has begun independent advocacy efforts and encouraged other board members to reach out to US Representative Congress member consideration of devastating cuts to Medicaid funding that would put access to mental health care at risk for millions of Americans as Congress will be voting on a House budget resolution bill that will start the process to cut \$800 billion from Medicaid over the next decade.

ACTION: MSHN sent a letter to MDHHS laying out the details inquiring about as to whether there will be some type of adjustment.

ACTION: Board members were encouraged to review public record of state, and local officials regarding their stance on various issues; specifically, Medicaid funding.

CEO Report

Joanne Holland, Chief Information Officer introduced Josh Siwek, IS Network, Support Manager and HIPAA Security Officer who presented on the CMHA-CEI Cybersecurity current threat landscape and mitigation practices and what we do to protect our organization.

CEO Lurie commented that CMHA-CEI is very fortunate to have Josh Siwek as part of our IS Network team. Highlights from the presentation included:

- Threat Landscape
- Attacks we have experienced
- Prevention & Remediation (Brute Force Attacks, Phishing Emails, Common Vulnerabilities & Exposures, Targeted Texting, Malware, Viruses, & Ransomware, Other Proactive Measures)
- The Future current plans for heightened security and additional challenges we expect to face.
- Password Policy
- M365

Board members inquired as to whether CMHA-CEI will use Artificial Intelligence tool and if so in what capacity, and also wondered if there were concerns regarding potential threats to the agency?

Chief Information Officer, Joanne Holland shared that just this week, the Directors Group reviewed the first draft of the Artificial Intelligence (AI)procedure, and recommended that as an agency, we focus on restricting use to administrative purposes, and not consider using it for clinical decision making purposes due to the risk associated. Additionally, we will continue looking at the benefits of the tool as well as assessing risk; keeping in mind that as part of the healthcare industry, our risk are potentially higher than other industries.

CEO Report

CEO, Sara Lurie presented the February 2025 CEO Report. Highlights from the report included the following:

 Special Milestone Recognition of Gwenda Summers as a strong leader and visionary for mental health services for 25 years, and dedicated service to CMHA- CEI.

• Governor's FY26 Executive Budget Proposal highlighting the items of significance to the public mental health system including CCBHC and Autism, and other potential projects on pages 13 - 17 of the packet.

Board member, Dwight Washington inquired as to whether the Department of Education gives mental health any of their \$7million? CEO, Lurie advised that they do not!

• Template Mental Health Provider advocacy letter on page 30 and 31 of the packet, reporting that members of Charter House under the direction of George Hatter, Coordinator set aside 2-days recently to make advocacy calls and write letters.

Board Chair, Maxine Thome shared that she has sent a copy of the template letter to a friend who sent it out nationwide to peer support training groups.

ACTION: CEO Lurie, will send an electronic copy of the template Mental Health Provider advocacy letter to each board members, NAMI and other community partners encouraging them to circulate to other professionals.

New board member, Jeanne Pearl-Wright inquired about services provided at Charter House as well as eligibility and requested to set up a time that she could go out and visit and have lunch on-site.

ACTION: Aleshia will reach out to George Hatter, Coordinator and coordinate a time for a visit.

Employee of the Year Event (EOY)
 Reporting that Luanne Ladley, has the distinction of being the last CMHA-CEI
 Employee of the Year (EOY) and was celebrated on Monday, January 27, 2025
 from 1:15 – 3:00 pm during a hybrid celebration of about 100 CMHA-CEI staff.

Chief Human Resources Officer, Jana Baylis reported that historically, this program has been in place since the 80's. However, was very excited to share that moving forward CMHA-CEI will continue the Employee of the Month (EOM) program, and look forward to putting more of an emphasis on celebrating all EOMs and making some additional funding available for gifts. The Special Projects Committee is also working on highlighting the EOMs for the first 6-months of the year (January – June) during the Annual Employee Appreciation Event.

^{*}On rare occasions, consumers may be admitted to the hospital who require substantially higher amounts of one to one staffing than is typical, due to highly aggressive or self-injurious behavior. Payor shall prior authorize up to two days Enhanced Staffing Inpatient Psychiatric Services for Consumers in this situation on a case by case basis. Criteria for Enhanced Staff Inpatient Psychiatric Services are as follows:

- 1. The Consumer must meet all of the Inpatient Admission Certification Criteria listed above (Diagnosis, Severity of Illness, and Intensity of Service).
- 2. The Consumer is failing at least restrictive placement despite active treatment, with no expectation of improvement in a timely manner, combined with risk factors to Customers or Hospital such as: Swallowing behavior on unit, aggression towards others, and/or extreme property destruction at such a level that Consumer requires constant attention from staff in order to prevent self-harm, harm others, or extreme property destruction.
